This is the first book in a series of three describing a "fast reading 22 notes of music method" invented by the author (she calls it fast attack). The material is for beginners, but the innovative method might save you months of struggle learning how to read music. The author also has an UDEMY series that covers the same method. These series came about because several of her

students confided with her that not being able to read notes fast enough was a barrier for aspiring musicians. The books are full of quick and smart drills to solidify 22 different notes in the staff. All in all, I am glad to have found these books. I gave it 5 stars because I feel that the author distills her years of teaching music experience in a unique method.

Great lessons! I'm sure a great hard copy book! However, the Kindle edition like most, has typos! Unfortunately some are in the answers to the quizzes and in the "Note Attack & Say It out Loud" statements. Still, bought the next 2 levels!

I liked the attack and say it out loud. Great way to picture the notes in your mind. Very good for beginners and anyone struggling with reading music. I give it 5 stars because it's powerful.

Recommend as a good approach to reading music, but author needs an editor. Beware of about 4 errors in first book. For me, it was a nice challenge to keep me on guard, but this does not change the fact that it needs editing.

This might be good for someone who has never encountered a music staff, or possibly a six year old. It is extremely limited in view. What it proposed to do could be better accomplished by old fashioned flash cards. Three are good apps available that are interactive which will provide much better practice.

Working with her short system got me to finally memorize the notes by letter, without counting or otherwise being slow. You memorize visually, not by ear. I tried using flashcards, but I find the drills in her book faster and more fun to use. Note that if you're using Kindle on a cell phone, you will need to select the diagrams (like the drill sheets) and hit magnify. It's a common problem with all Kindle book graphics. They just don't scale well. There are some links to videos for much more money that I ignored.

It's always nice to have other ideas on how to teach note reading. It could use some editing, as it reads like the author's first language is not English.

I was literally able to site read after only a couple of hours. The rest of the series is great too

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
