Although I now have a copy of, "The Happiness Advantage," I still refer to the (Summary Station Edition) because it is a fast way to review the essential details and research on how and why to develop "Happiness" within, as presented in the original book by Achor. This is one of the finest reads I have uncovered in a long while! I would always wish to have both of these books in my library.

This brief summary work is just plain awful, not deserving one star even. It includes glaring typos, grammatical errors, even chapter headings with incorrect words used (principle/principal), shift in person throughout the entire reading from 3rd person to "you" conversational 2nd person, "its" and "it's" and possessives used incorrectly, and a fundamentally childish summary of the book and research. Strangely enough, I am a happy and positive person, and as I read I began to wonder if I was being tested for some therapeutic response of gratitude (a fundamental happiness factor in Achor's book). Impossible. This is an awful document, written at a failing middle-school level, with editorial renderings to match. I will ask for a refund of my \$2.99, as this document does not belong in the reputable marketplace.

The original "Happiness Advantage" surprised me...I normally don't like "self-help" motivation type books, but this one sucked me in and I feel I have gained some excellent tools to veer my life toward a happier road. I thought this summary would be a quick way for me to "recharge" myself with an easy access review of the 7 tricks ('principals') from the original book that have been so successful for me. But although this summary is a great idea, I found very little inspiration reading it. The best thing it offered me was realizing that is in large part the style of the original author that made that book so inspiring for me, not just the facts and conclusions. In the end, this book encouraged me to go back and reread the original. Now instead of reading the Summary, I just content myself with re-reading the original a little bit at a time.

This book is pathetic. I'm sending it back - I should have read the other reviews. The font is so large - probably 20 with only 14 lines per page. If the font and spacing were normal it would be about 6-7 pages. I'm not "happy" with it. If you have ever written a review you know that a one star rating lights up the words "I hate it" !
